



# Catholic Education SA's Religious Education Curriculum **'CROSSWAYS'** and Learning Links to the Mary Mackillop Museum

## A SCHEMA TO LINK *CROSSWAYS* WITH MARY MACKILLOP MUSEUM VISITS FOR YEAR LEVELS



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The schema outlines the *Crossways* strands and doctrines for year levels that can link with a visit to the Mary MacKillop Museum with particular emphasis about what to view in the exhibitions.

## BIG IDEAS TO APPLY TO LEARNING ABOUT SAINT MARY MACKILLOP

Big Ideas are generalised summaries of what we want students to understand by the end of their RE in school. They are common destinations, which can be reached by many alternative routes. Because Big Ideas describe what we want students to understand, they frame the questions that lead to that understanding. They are unable to do this without contexts provided by content. It is therefore unlikely that students will ever encounter a unit of work with the name of a Big Idea as its title, but in every unit of work the learning outcomes will be defined in relation to them.


